## EDITORIAL GUIDELINES

The Journal for Greater Mekong Subregion (GMS) Development Studies is a multidisciplinary publication that seeks to promote better understanding of development issues in the GMS. The journal is published twice a year, in June and December, respectively, by the Asian Development Bank under the auspices of the Phnom Penh Plan for Development Management --- a regional capacity building initiative under the GMS Economic Cooperation Program. The Journal is targeted at a broad range of planners, policy makers, academics, and researchers. In addition to its primary objective of disseminating knowledge about the GMS, the Journal is intended to serve as a catalyst for further research and discussion about the GMS.

**Journal Scope.** The Journal invites original contributions from scholars, researchers, and practitioners dealing with GMS development issues. Articles should have strong emphasis on the policy implications flowing from the analysis, and should also present this from a regional perspective.

**Article Content.** Articles should be between 5,000 and 8,000 words in length. The first page should include the title of the paper and complete institutional affiliation of all authors. For coauthored articles, a principal author should be identified for purposes of correspondence, and an e-mail address should be included, if possible. The second page should contain the abstract (see below) and brief acknowledgments of those who assisted in fieldwork, analyses, or preparation of the article. The acknowledgments will appear as a footnote on the first printed page, along with any other information the author or editor may wish to include concerning authorship (e.g. financial support for the research).

There are no prescribed sections for articles, bearing in mind the diversity of possible topics and approaches to development. However, in general there should be an Introduction that sets the stage for the article's thesis; a brief Methodology section if applicable; Results of analyses, surveys, etc; Discussion of results; and Conclusions, including policy implications of the results. Articles should be properly referenced. References in the text follow the (Author date) system and must be listed alphabetically in a Reference section at the end of the article. Care must be taken to include all and only those items cited in the text of the article.

**Abstract.** An abstract of not more than 250 words should accompany the article and provide a highly readable summary of the article's objectives, methods, conclusions, and, normally, policy implications. The abstract should not contain jargon or include references.

**Style.** The Journal's reference for spelling is *Merriam Webster's Collegiate Dictionary, Tenth Edition*. Following are examples of reference punctuation and style for commonly used documents.

For book references:

Author(s). Date. *Title, Capitalized in Italics*. City: Publisher.

Author(s). Date. Title Capitalized. *Journal Name in Italics* Volume(number): pages.

For website documents:

**Illustrations** should be in black and white only. Footnotes should be kept to a minimum.

**Book Reviews** should be 1,000-1,500 words in length. Reviews are generally by invitation only and concern books and monographs of interest to GMS development. Publishers are invited to send book announcements to the editor. The published review will be forwarded to the book's publisher.

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**Peer Review.** All articles are subject to review by two referees. Although the journal editor reserves the right to appoint referees, authors may also nominate suitable referees. Such nominees must not have a conflict of interest with the authors. The full mailing address, including e-mail, should be provided along with a short description of the nominees' qualifications to review the manuscript.

**Acceptance.** After review by referees, an article may require additions or changes to reflect their comments. A time limit is given for revision of papers after review. Authors may dispute referees' comments but must do so within the allotted time frame. Authors will be notified of final acceptance and the corresponding author will be sent 5 copies of the printed article.
