Project Rationale and Linkage to Country/Regional Strategy	In 2015, Viet Nam''s rapid urbanization enables cities to provide home to more than a third of the total population contribute to approximately 70% of national gross domestic product of \$191.5 billion (\$2,109 per capita). Environmental sustainability, inclusiveness, and climate resilience of Ha Giang, Hue, and Vinh Yen strengthened

Progress Toward Outcome Ha Giang PMU: ADB approved the PPC's request for IA change from the Project Management Unit (PMU) under Ha Giang City People's Committee to the Program Coordination Office, Commodity Oriented Poverty Reduction Program (CPRP), under Ha Giang Province (Ha Giang PCO) on 08 April 2022. The handover has just been completed recently.L.3591: The contract for the construction supervision consultants in Ha Giang (HG-CS01) was signed on 12 May 2021. The consultant was on board to support PMU, however in Ha Giang no major progress has been made since December 2021, out of total 7 packages: 3 packages were awarded; 3 BERs are being finalized by PMU. The last package HG-CW05 is expected to be procured in Q1/2023. The procurement progress in Ha Giang is seriously impacted by the slow land acquisition process and design changes resulting from land acquisition constraints. BERs of several packages have been finalized but the PMU has been unable to proceed to contract signing due to the unavailability of the Resettlement Plans. Resettlement cost overruns are currently delaying the project, but with some technical scope changes the resettlement costs could be brought to 190bn VND for the whole project, or 132.8bn VND more than the allocated budget (63bn VND). The payment issues for the consultant under HG-CS01 has now been pending for more than a year. Currently, most consultants under HG-CS01 were demobilized and the new PMU is now still discussing with HG PPC on solutions.G. 0549: The contract is expected to be signed in Q4 2022. The international advisor on smart lighting will be on board to support the PMU in November 2022. Hue and Vinh Yen are progressing as planned.
