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I. INTRODUCTION

1. The e-Asia and Knowledge Partnership Fund (the Fund) was established in the Asian Development Bank (ADB) in June 2006 with a contribution of \$20 million from the Government of the Republic of Korea, represented by the Ministry of Finance and Economy and the Export-Import Bank of Korea. The annual report for the Fund is prepared by ADB's Regional and Sustainable Development Department (RSDD) in collaboration with ADB's Office of Cofinancing Operations (OCO). The purpose of the report is to describe and review the progress of the Fund operations during the period July 2007–June 2008, in compliance with the reporting requirements stipulated in the ADB Board paper regarding the Fund¹ and the ADB–Republic of Korea Channel Financing Agreement. The Fund's grant status and financial statement as of 30 June 2008 are in Appendixes 1 and 2.

II. BACKGROUND

A. Overview

- 2. Information and knowledge are fundamental resources for economic and social development. Information and communication technology (ICT) fosters development by expanding opportunities for the creation, transformation, and distribution of information and knowledge, reducing transaction costs, and contributing to the possible acceleration of innovation.² The Fund aims to contribute to poverty reduction and foster economic and social development in ADB's developing member countries (DMCs) through its two windows: the e-Asia program and the knowledge partnership program. Projects from all DMCs of ADB are eligible for funding from the Fund.
- 3. **e-Asia program.** The program seeks to contribute to poverty reduction and economic and social development in DMCs through ICT. The e-Asia program supports promotion of ICT for development and bridging of the digital divide, especially through national and regional estrategies involving government, health, learning, trade, commerce, finance, procurement, and environment.
- 4. In Asia and the Pacific, concerns are mounting over the growing "digital divide"— the difference between those that have the capacity and resources to access ICT and those that do not. ADB's ICT strategy paper³ recognizes that ICT is a powerful force in shaping the social and economic development of Asia and the Pacific. ADB has an important role to play in helping its DMCs benefit from new opportunities created by ICT.
- 5. In support of ADB's ICT strategy, the e-Asia program provides: (i) financing of ICT-related activities, including technical assistance (TA); (ii) studies, research, and analytical work; (iii) capacity building and development of human resources through education and training; (iv) information dissemination, networking, and cross-learning (e.g., policy consultations, seminars and workshops, conferences, publications, and websites); and, (v) piloting of innovative ways to promote ICT.

- Knowledge partnership program. The program aims to reduce poverty and foster economic and social development in DMCs by increasing the effectiveness of poverty reduction activities and strengthening the capacity of DMCs. The objective of the program is to facilitate the sharing of information, knowledge, and experiences in the region for poverty reduction and social development.
- 7. ADB's framework on knowledge management recognizes the need for DMCs to acquire and apply relevant knowledge to accelerate poverty reduction to meet the targets associated with the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). To maintain the relevance of ADB in responding to the varying and complex poverty reduction needs in the region, the framework proposes that ADB be more effective in sharing knowledge and more proactive in supporting learning.
- The knowledge partnership program supports ADB's knowledge management 8. framework through: (i) policy advice and dialogue and TA involving the use of experts on economic development and capacity building; (ii) capacity building and institutional development in DMCs, including training workshops, vocational training, and long and short training and learning courses; (iii) publications that will disseminate knowledge regarding successful development approaches to developing countries in the region; (iv) studies, research, and analytical work; (v) projects on reforming government, improving governance in the business and financial sectors, and privatizing state-owned enterprises; and (vi) information dissemination, networking, and cross-learning (e.g., policy consultations, seminars, workshops, conferences).

B. **Fund Administration**

- ADB's RSDD is responsible for technical and implementation aspects of the Fund while ADB's OCO is responsible for the Fund's general and financial aspects. ADB has managed the fund website since August 2006, which is used to disseminate fund-related information including guidelines, processing procedures, and the list of approved projects.⁵
- 10. For quality assurance of projects under the Fund, ADB established a review committee as a technical advisory group, chaired by the deputy director general of RSDD. It consists of representatives from operational and non-operational departments. RSDD, as the review committee secretariat, also consults on proposal requests, liaises with the review committee regarding project proposals, and corresponds with the Government regarding proposals endorsed by the review committee.
- 11. Criteria. To be eligible for funding, proposals: (i) should be conceptually, programmatically, and procedurally aligned with the ADB country partnership strategy (formerly the country strategy and program) or its annual updates and with the regional cooperation strategy and program or its annual updates; (ii) should be in line with the regional action plan toward an information society in Asia and the Pacific⁶ and in support of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) principles; (iii) should be discussed with key country stakeholders as soon as possible; (iv) shall use expertise from Asia and the Pacific to the extent possible; (v) will encourage contributions, either in kind or in cash, from DMCs benefiting from activities financed under the Fund; (vi) will be encouraged to collaborate with the United Nations Economic and

Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific, the United Nations Development Programme, and the International Telecommunications Union; (vii) should be utilized in the most cost-effective way; and (viii) may provide cofinancing opportunities with the Republic of Korea and other funding agencies if the Fund is used for preparing investment projects.

12. **Approval process.** A proposal to the Fund consists of (i) the concept paper, (ii) the design and monitoring framework, (iii) the detailed cost estimate table and (iv) ICT classification sheet (required only for the e-Asia program). The review committee assesses if the concept paper meets the country eligibility and project criteria; makes recommendations on whether the concept paper is accepted, needs revision, or is rejected; and provides technical comments and suggestions if necessary. Upon clearance by the review committee, the revised concept paper is circulated to key support departments that are not part of the concerned review committee for their comments. The concept paper must then be cleared by the respective vice–president or the managing–director general, subject to endorsement of the Government. Upon clearance of the concept, RSDD submits the proposal with complete requirements to the Government for endorsement. The Government will review proposals within 45 calendar days from the date of submission; if the Government fails to respond within this time period, the proposal will be considered to have been endorsed by the Government for financing under the Fund. The Fund's detailed processing procedure is described in Appendix 3.


C. Monitoring and Evaluation

13. The progress of projects financed by the Fund is monitored through annual progress reports submitted by the project officer. The template for these reports is in Appendix 4.

III. EVALUATION OF THE FUND OPERATIONS

- 14. **Approvals.** A total of 14 proposals were submitted to RSDD for consideration under the Fund between July 2007 and June 2008. Out of 12 proposals endorsed by the review committee, the Government approved 11 projects, amounting to \$5.15 million in the second year of the Fund's operation. As of the end of June 2008, ADB approved five of the 11 government-approved projects. The detailed description of the 11 projects is in Appendix 5.


Figure 1: Proposals and Approvals under the Fund (July 2007–June 2008)

- 15. Figure 1 compares the number of proposals submitted, endorsed and approved in July 2007–June 2008. Most of the proposals were submitted in the second half of 2007, as was the case in 2006.

16. Figure 2 compares the proposals submitted and approved under each program. In contrast to the situation in the Fund's first year of operation, during the second year (July 2007–June 2008) there were an equal number of proposals for the e-Asia program and the knowledge partnership program, apparently due to an increase in awareness of the latter, and a recognition of the importance of capacity development and/or knowledge sharing/networking.

- 17. **e-Asia program.** Four projects will be funded under this program: (i) Capacity Building and School Networking for Educational Services (e-learning) in Thailand; (ii) Capacity Building for Housing Microfinance (formerly e-Tools for Community Focused Urban Poverty Reduction in the Philippines); (iii) Deploying Innovative Information and Communication Technology (ICT) for Supporting e-Governance in Assam (India); and (iv) Piloting Community e-Centers for Better Health in Lao People's Democratic Republic (PDR) (Table 1). Total requirements for these projects is \$2,000,000.
- 18. The projects under the e-Asia program are classified according to WSIS action plans (Appendix 6). The projects in India, Lao PDR, Philippines, and Thailand, support providing access to information and knowledge, notably through the internet and access to community ecenters (excluding in India), improving ICT literacy through capacity building, and implementing ICT applications in areas such as learning (Thailand and India), government and business (India), health (Lao PDR), employment (India), the environment (Philippines) and agriculture (India). Other WSIS action plans supported by projects in the India, Philippines, and Thailand include the building of infrastructure.

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The World Summit for Information Society (WSIS) Plan of Action sets targets for 2005–2015 to realize the vision of an inclusive and equitable information society.

19. **Knowledge partnership program.** Seven projects will be funded under this program: (i) Knowledge Transfer for Public Procurement in Nepal; (ii) Knowledge Sharing Program Using Good Asian Practices in Innovation and Development; (iii) public-private partnership (PPP) Infrastructure Projects; (iv) Promoting Environmental Compliance and Enforcement in Asia; (v) Support for the Implementation of the Capacity Development Action Plan: Strengthening Sector Capacity Focus and Knowledge Management; (vi) Upscaling Good Practices in Poverty Reduction and Network Links; and (vii) Institutional Modernization to Improve the Business Environment in Armenia (Table 2). With the exception of (i) above—Knowledge Transfer for Public Procurement in Nepal—all projects will cover more than one DMC. The total financing is \$3,150,000, including \$500,000 for each project except Promoting Environmental Compliance and Enforcement in Asia, which will receive \$150,000.





Figure 3: Sector Distribution of Approved Projects

20. **Portfolio Distribution.** Most proposals during this period are multisector, covering cover two or more sectors (41%), with 39% addressing law, economic management, and public policy. One project focuses on education and one on health, nutrition, and social protection. This can be seen in Figure 3. These initial projects show that ICT can be applied in different sectors of the economy, and that ADB, through the Fund, can help countries benefit from new opportunities created by ICT. The projects aim to develop e-applications that benefit all aspects of life, with a special focus on the needs of the poor in areas in line with the Fund's objectives (e.g., e-learning in rural communities and transport and communications; e-business in the finance sector; and e-government in law, economic management, and public policy). Five of the projects will cover more than one DMC, while the rest are country-specific (Armenia, India, Lao PDR, Nepal, the Philippines, and Thailand). The five regional projects focus on sharing best practices among DMCs with respect to innovation, poverty reduction, environmental compliance and enforcement, strengthening of sector capacity development and knowledge management, and PPP country frameworks.

IV. EVALUATION OF THE OPERATION OF THE FUND (2006–2008)

- 21. **Approvals.** The Government has approved 17 proposals, amounting to \$8.15 million, since 2006. As of the end of June 2008, ADB had approved nine of the 17 Government-approved projects. The detailed description of the 17 projects is in Appendix 5.
- 22. Figure 4 shows a comparison of proposals submitted and approved from July 2006 to June 2008. The Fund's review committee endorsed 85% of total proposals submitted to RSDD, while the Government approved 74% of the proposals endorsed by the review committee. Most of the proposals were submitted in the second half of both 2006 and 2007.
- 23. In the first year of operation, there was unequal demand between the e-Asia and knowledge partnership programs, but many proposals sought funding under the knowledge partnership program during the second year (Figure 5).

- 24. **e-Asia program.** Fund commitments under this program total \$4,000,000 for eight projects. One project—the regional project on Preparing the South Asia Subregional Economic Cooperation Information Highway Project, covering Bangladesh, Bhutan, Nepal, and India—is nearing completion. The country project for India on Deploying Innovative ICT for Supporting e-Governance in Assam is at the inception stage. The projects under the e-Asia program are classified according to the WSIS action plans (Appendix 6 shows this classification for all approved projects).
- 25. **Knowledge partnership program.** Fund commitments under this program total \$4,150,000 for a total of nine projects. Of these, the country project for Mongolia on Institutional Strengthening for Customs Modernization is at the inception stage. The regional project on Promoting Environmental Compliance and Enforcement in Asia is midway through implementation.
- 26. **Implementation and disbursement.** Of the \$20.0 million received from the Government, \$8.15 million is being allocated to 17 projects as of the end of June 2008. Actual disbursements for all projects as of the end of June 2008 amounted to \$634,968.57, because most projects are still in the initial stage of project preparation and/or implementation. Appendix 5 shows the implementation status of all projects.
- 27. **Portfolio distribution.** The projects approved in the Fund's first two years covered various sectors but most fall under one of two categories: law, economic management, and public policy (32%) and multisector (26%) projects (Figure 6). Table 3 shows the distribution in terms of the number of approvals, with at least one project for each ADB sector. Ten projects are country-specific, and seven benefit more than one country in the region.

V. ISSUES AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 28. **TA processing.** Nine of the 17 Government-approved project proposals have been approved by ADB. Two projects approved by the Government in 2006 are still awaiting ADB approval: (i) Hazard Risk Assessment using Geo-Information Technology (Viet Nam); and (ii) a regional project: Harmonization of Asian Bond Standards. To ensure timely project approval and implementation, ADB will more closely monitor the project processing schedule.
- 29. **Fund utilization and visibility.** In its first two years of operation (July 2006 to June 2008) the Fund utilized \$8.15 million. To ensure effective utilization of the Fund, ADB will actively identify appropriate project concepts and disseminate the information concerning the Fund. ADB will also encourage projects approved under the Fund to include various promotional activities to increase the visibility of the Fund.
- 30. **Consultation between ADB and the Government.** According to the Fund agreement, ADB and the Government are required to meet at least once a year to review the status of the Fund's operations and discuss any issues. Two consultation meetings were held in Korea each in October 2006 and October 2008, with informal coordination and consultation via e-mails or phone calls. A regular consultation is recommended to better program the use of the Fund and to manage the Fund more effectively.

In the project in Viet Nam, the delay was due to the departure of the project officer. It was recently decided to piggyback the project to the loan for the Emergency Rehabilitation of Calamity Damage Project, which is expected to be approved in November 2008. The Harmonization of Asian Bond Standards project was delayed because of a change of project officer and difficulties in securing additional funding of \$450,000 from another source. The project is expected to begin in May 2009.

PROCESSING PROCEDURE FOR THE e-ASIA AND KNOWLEDGE PARTNERSHIP FUND

Project Processing Procedure

1. Concept Preparation

1. The Asian Development Bank (ADB) project officer who plans to apply for the Fund must prepare a concept paper using ADB's template.

2. Concept Review

- 2. ADB has established a review committee for the Fund. The review committee acts as a technical advisory group for quality assurance of the projects under the Fund. The review committee will be chaired by deputy director general, Regional and Sustainable Development Department (RSDD), and comprises a representative from each regional department, and from the Office of Information Systems and Technology (OIST) and the Central Operations Service Office (COSO).
- 3. Prior to interdepartmental review in line with ADB's business processes,¹ the concerned review committee (i) assesses whether the concept paper meets the country eligibility and project criteria; (ii) makes recommendations regarding acceptance, revision, or rejection of the paper; and (iii) provides technical comments and suggestions as necessary. The review is based on the concept paper, a cost estimate table, design and monitoring framework, and an information and communication technology (ICT) classification sheet (for the e-Asia program only), which must be sent to the RSDD Knowledge Management Center for coordination with the concerned review committee. A meeting of the review committee will be called by the RSDD deputy director general when there are conflicting views among the committee members.
- 4. Upon the clearance by the review committee, the ADB project officer must circulate the revised concept paper to other key support departments that were not included in the review committee for their comments.²

3. Concept Clearance

5. The concept paper must then be cleared by the respective vice–president (or in the case of departments reporting directly to the President, by the managing–director general), subject to endorsement of funding from the Government of Korea.³ Those concept papers that have already been approved—including the country partnership strategy (formerly country strategy and program) or its annual updates, the regional cooperation strategy and program or its

5. Endorsement by the Government

7. The director general of RSDD will submit the proposal to the Government for endorsement. The Government will review the proposals within 45 calendar days from the date of submission. In the event the Government does not respond within the indicated time period, the proposal will be considered as endorsed by the Government for financing under the Fund.

6. Project Processing

8. Upon endorsement by the Government, the ADB project officer will process the proposal according to ADB's technical assistance or loan processing procedures, with appropriate modifications.
