- selected priorities of social protection programs, including conduct cost-benefit analysis on the proposed priorities;

- in collaboration with the international and national consultants, prepare the regional report on financing and fiscal space for expanding social protection programs, fiscal space and strategic framework; and prepare ADB brief (maximum 8 pages) on the summary of regional findings;
- contribute to and support the information dissemination activities of ADB's social protection team in ADB's Sustainable Development and Climate Change (SDCC) Department and the technical capacity-building activities under the TA; and

- identify possible financing options to introduce and/or scale up social protection systems
 and provide a detailed description of the distinct risks and trade-offs that are associated with
 each of the options. The uniqueness of each country requires that fiscal space options be
 carefully examined at the national level and alternatives fully explored in consultation with
 relevant government agencies;
