I. INTRODUCTION

1. The Ministry of Education and Training (MOET) is implementing the Second Upper Secondary Education Development Project (USEDP II, or the Project) in the 33 provinces of Viet Nam, through Loan № 2929 – VIE (SF) from Asian Development Bank. Under the Project, a total of 135 upper secondary schools (USSs) and six (6) pedagogical centers have been selected for assistance. In the screening and categorization for social safeguards, Category A subprojects are automatically excluded, while Category C subprojects shall be prioritized for financing. The subproject USSs with minor impacts (Category B) may be considered subject to the preparation and implementation of a resettlement plan (RP) acceptable to ADB, as prescribed in 2009 Safeguard Policy Statement (SPS). The RP for Category B subproject shall be approved first by the Bank and disclosed in the ADB website before implementation by MOET.

2. Hau Giang Province belongs to Mekong Delta. It borders with Can Tho City, Vinh Long Province on the north, Bac Lieu Province on the south, Soc Trang Province on the east, and Kien Giang Province on the west. Seven (7) beneficiary USSs were selected for the Project, namely: (i) Luong Tam Upper Secondary School; (ii) Le Hong Phong Upper Secondary School; (iii) Phu Huu Upper Secondary School; (iv) Cay Duong Upper Secondary School; (v) Truong Long Tay; (vi) Tan Phu Upper Secondary School; and (vii) Hoa An Upper Secondary School. As screened, both are Category C subprojects under the Involuntary Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples categorization (Attachments 1 to 7), since no social impacts are expected inside the schools' premises. The Central Project Management Unit (CPMU) of USEDP II has submitted this Due Diligence Report (DDR) for information of ADB and to secure its "No Objection" for the award of civil works contract for the construction of school facilities.

II. APPROACH AND METHODOLOGY IN DUE DILIGENCE

3. The CPMU has applied the selection criteria in evaluating the USSs included in the long list. The criteria were developed during the PPTA. Given the large number of USSs and their geographic locations, the CPMU sent questionnaires for filling up by the school officials whose responses were the basis for screening and selection in producing the shortlist of USSs. The school officials of shortlisted USSs were then given two sets of questionnaires. The first set was used in gathering information on their proposed facilities and statistical data that justify their proposal. The proposed investments were then screened and made the reasonable distribution of facilities that are urgently needed. The second set was aimed to validate if land acquisition shall be required. National resettlement specialist and CPMU civil work assistance conducted site survey and consultation with key officials of the Hau Giang PPMU and proposed schools during 9-11 December 2014 to verify information provided by the Hau Giang PPMU.

III. THE PROPOSED FACILITIES

4. The seven (7) USSs will construct 10 regular classrooms and 13 function rooms for the classes in physics, chemistry, and laboratory. The construction of regular classrooms will follow the standard dimension as provided for in Decision № 37/2008/QĐ-BGDĐT (July 16, 2008) by MOET. The following dimension of each classroom is as follows: length = 7.8 m and width = 9.9 m. Comprising the width is 7.5 m working area and 2.4 m for the corridor. Each classroom shall have a total area of 56.77 m².

5. The function rooms shall have the following dimensions: length = 11.7 m and width = 9.6 m. The length shall be composed of 7.8 m for working area and 3.9 m for preparation room of teacher. The width is composed of 7.5 m for activity room and 2.1 m for the corridor. Overall, each function room shall have a total area of 83.92 m² in which 56.47 m² for activity room and 27.45 m² for preparation room of the teacher.

6. The distribution of the proposed facilities in seven (7) schools is shown in Table 1.

IV. BRIEF PROFILE OF THE USSs

A. Luong Tam Secondary School

7. The school was established in 2008 in Luong Tam Commune of Long My District. The school has 7,166 m² of land and only uses 1,500 m² for the school buildings. In school-year 2013-2014, a total of 431 students were enrolled, 204 are males and 227 are females. The students were composed of 153 from Grade 10, 166 in Grade 11 and 112 in Grade 12. The Kinh group is being the majority (97.68%), and the 2.32% are EM groups.

8. For the last five (5) school-years, enrolment averages to 468 students. Luong Tam USS has 32 personnel, 4 are non-teaching staff and 28 are teachers, in which 25 are Kinh and three (3) are ethnic minorities. The teachers are all graduates of universities with three (3) have had master degrees and one (1) are pursuing for their master courses.

B. Le Hong Phong Upper Secondary School (VinhTuong Branch)

9. The school was established in 2013 in Vinh Hieu village, Vinh Tuong commune in Vi Thuy District, it serves two (2) communes. Its premises occupy a total of 3,629 m² of land. Of the total lands, 960 m² are occupied by school buildings. During the school-year 2013-2014, some 124 students were enrolled in the school, 63 are males and 61 are females. Enrolment comprised by 85 students from Grade 10, 16 in Grade 11 and 23 in Grade 12. Ethnicity of the students were Kinh.

10. Guiding the school are nine (9) teachers and all of them are graduated of universities with one (1) teachers have master degrees.

C. Phu Huu Upper Secondary School

11. The school became operational in 2008 and was established in Phu Loi Village, Phu Huu Commune of Chau Thanh District. The school has 12,000 m² of land with only 1,141 m² are used for school buildings. It serves the students in: communes of Phu Huu, Phu Tan, Xuan Hoa, Tan Thanh and sub-town Mai Dam. During the school-year 2013-2014, a total of 421 students were enrolled, 195 are males and 226 are females. The students were composed of 122 from Grade 10, 157 in Grade 11 and 142 in Grade 12, and belong to Kinh group.

12. The school is in need of 02 function rooms that serve for teaching and studying of teachers and students. It has 32 personnel, one (1) is non-teaching staff and 31 are teachers with three (3) are EM teacher. The teachers are all graduates of universities with one teacher (1) has already a master degree.

D. Cay Duong Upper Secondary School (Bung Tau Branch)

13. The school was built in 2001 at Hoa Hung village, Bung Tau sub-town of Phung Hiep District and occupies a total area of 11,387 m². About 1,800 m² are used for school buildings. For the school-year 2013-2014, some 272 students were enrolled, 149 are males and 153 are females. The school's population were comprised by 144 students from Grade 10, 89 in Grade 11 and 69 in Grade 12. The Kinh represents 99.2% and the Khme 0.8%.

14. Student enrolment in Cay Duong USS varies from 2009-2013. From 90 students in school-year 2009-2010 it grew to 236 in school-year 2010-2011 and 296 in 2011-2012 and 261 in 2012-2013. Sixteen (16) teachers are employed by the school, 10 are males and 06 are females, where all of them are "Kinh". All teachers have university education.

E. Truong Long Tay Upper Secondary School

15. The school was established in 2009 at Truong Tho A village, Truong Long Tay commune of Chau Thanh A district. Its premises occupy a total of 16,000 m² of land. Of the total lands, 1450 m² are used for school buildings and other facilities. During the school-year 2013-2014, some 364 students were enrolled, 170 are males and 194 are females. Enrolment comprised 146 students from Grade 10, 108 in Grade 11 and 110 in Grade 12. Ethnicity of the students were majority with Kinh of 99% and Khme of 1%.

16. The school has been operating since 2009 and for the last years, enrolment was average 324. The school has 31 personnel, six (6) of which are non-teaching staff and 26 are teachers, 16 are males and 10 are females. 25 are Kinh while 01 is EM. All teachers are graduates of universities with five (5) teachers have master degrees.

F. Tan Phu Upper Secondary School

17. Established in 2006, the Tan Phu USS occupies a total land of 17,234 m² in Tan Hung II village, Tan Phu commune of Long My district. About 1750 m² are occupied by school buildings and serves twelve seven (7) communes. During the school-year 2013-2014, enrolment was totaled to 566 students, consisting 271 boys and 295 girls. A total of 229 students were enrolled in Grade 10, 201 in Grade 11 and 136 in Grade 12. All students are "Kinh".

18. Student enrolment in Phu Thong USS in recent years was 780 in school year 2008-2009; 553 in 2009-2010; 557 in 2010-2011; 505 in 2011-2012 and 528 in 2012-2013. The school has yet been equipped with function rooms which limit the teaching and learning of teacher and student. Guiding the students were 40 teachers of Kinh group. All teachers have university education as four (4) has master. The school has 08 non-teaching personnel.

G. Hoa An Upper Secondary School

19. The school was established in 2008 in Hoa An Commune, Phung Hiep District. The school has 17,324 m² of land and only uses 2,808 m² for the school buildings. In school-year 2013-2014, a total of 234 students were enrolled, 106 are males and 128 are females. The students were composed of 77 from Grade 10, 95 in Grade 11 and 62 in Grade 12. All students are the "Kinh" group.

20. For the last five (5) school-years, enrolment averages to 262 students. Hoa An USS has 24 personnel, 04 are non-teaching staff and 18 are teachers, in which 17 are Kinh and one (1) is EM. The teachers are all graduates of universities.

V. ASSESSMENT OF SOCIAL IMPACTS

21. There are no social impacts expected arising from land acquisition in two USS in Hau Giang Province. The school premises are enclosed with concrete or wooden fences as protection from encroachers, and neither a house nor structure of private person was allowed by the school administration. Given the total land requirements of the proposed facilities, they were assessed as to their impacts on available lands in the respective school premises.

- **Luong Tam Upper Secondary School.** This school proposes for 04 function rooms in a 02-storey building. The structure will be built in the land of 357.63m² within the existing school compound of 7,166 m² land. No land acquisition is required and no third-party user will be affected.
- **Le Hong Phong Upper Secondary School (Vinh Tuong Branch).** The proposed facilities for this school is 01 function room in a 01-storey building. The structure will be built in the land of 173.16 m² within the existing school compound of 3,629 m². No land acquisition is required and no third-party user will be affected.
- **Phu Huu Upper Secondary School.** This school proposes for 02 function rooms in a 01-storey building. The structure will be built in the land of 329.16 m² within the existing school compound of 12,000 m². No land acquisition is required and no third-party user will be affected.
- **Cay Duong Upper Secondary School (Bung Tau School Branch).** This school proposes for 10 classrooms in a 01-storey building. The structure will be built in the land of 485 m² within the existing school compound. No land acquisition is required and no third-party user will be affected.
- **Truong Long Tay Upper Secondary School.** This school proposes for 02 function-rooms in a 01-storey building. The structure will be built in the land of 322 m² within the existing school compound of 16,000 m². No land acquisition is required and no third-party user will be affected.
- **Tan Phu Upper Secondary School.** This school proposes for 02 function-rooms in a 01-storey building. The structure will be built at an area of 322 m² within the existing school compound of 17,234 m². No land acquisition is required and no third-party user will be affected.
- **Hoa An Upper Secondary School.** This school proposes for 02 function-rooms in a 01-storey building. The structure will be built in the land of 325 m² within the existing school compound of 17,324 m². No land acquisition is required and no third-party user will be affected.

22. With the foregoing information on the proposed subprojects in HAU GIANG Province, request for “No Objection” for the award of civil works contracts is being sought by MOET from ADB.
