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## **A. Executive Summary**

1. The Project will help improve urban infrastructure, its planning and management; enhance urban livelihoods; and increase capacity for administering urban infrastructure supply and maintenance works through three components. Since there are three affected persons identified under component B i.e., Phuentsholing, their details are as enumerated and appended in **Annex 1**. On the left Bank of Omchuu, the construction work of the approach road (of length 140m) will affect two persons (1 having 2 household members and another having 6 household members ) while on the right bank of Omchuu the construction work of an approach road (of length 300m) will affect one persons (having 3 household members)<sup>1</sup>. The details of all the three affected persons are presented in Matrix. Since the affected persons were earlier enjoying free housing provided with basic amenities, they have been relocated to a better housing now with all basic amenities. The transportation of their belongings to their new location was provided by the Phuentsholing Thromde. During the recent interview survey held on 24<sup>th</sup> Jan 2017 with the three affected persons, they were found to be content with their new housing.

2. The land under both the approach roads construction is Thromde (RGoB) owned land and therefore there is no need for either land compensation or cash compensation for land. The land certificate provided by the Phuentsholing Thromde is in **Annex 2**. Regarding other private assets such as fruit trees, no fruit trees are affected due to the Project hence no compensation for fruit trees is required to be paid. The GRC and Entitlement Matrix are prepared based on the Policy of ADB SPS 2009.

3. The Project Google site map is appended in **Annex 7**.

## **B. Project Description**

4. Output 2 for Phuentsholing includes planning, survey, investigation and design of second bridge and connecting roads in Phuentsholing. This involves evolving the best possible alignment of the proposed bridge/flyover and the associated connecting/approach roads, undertaking detailed engineering design of the most suitable option for road and bridge/flyover works and preparing cost estimates for obtaining project sanction.

5. The overall main benefits of the Project will be (i) improved urban environment, public health, and living standards in SamdrupJongkhar, Thimphu and Phuentsholing; (ii) effectively managed, reliable and sustainable urban services; and (iii) improved economic and social conditions from investments in bridge and approach roads and water supply and sanitation.

## **C. Scope of Land Acquisition and Resettlement**

6. This Resettlement Planning (RP) document is prepared for component B: Urban Infrastructure Project for Phuentsholing Thromde under “Construction of 46 meter span PC

7. Girder Bridge and Approach Road”, however, the construction of 46m span Girder Bridge was re-tendered. The photograph of the vicinity of the proposed construction site/approach roads of both river banks of Omchuu is attached in **Annex 6**. This resettlement plan is prepared for the Construction of Approach roads on both sides of Omchuu River for which the Project minimizes land acquisition and resettlement. The selection of subcomponents included a criterion on resettlement impacts. Priority was given to components involving rehabilitation within the premises of existing urban infrastructure facilities, and construction of new facilities in government land. Resettlement impacts will further be minimized through “Due Diligence” report submitted earlier which shall be updated if required. Since there are three affected persons, the Project is categorized as **“Category B”** Project.

8. No private land acquisition is required for component B. During site visit, it was observed that there are three affected persons who are going to be displaced. All the three displaced persons are working with Phuentsholing Thromde as staffs under (i) Customer Service Cell on <sup>2</sup>muster roll, (ii) a Security Guard also on muster roll and (iii) a driver who is a permanent staff. The displaced affected persons were relocated to better residential quarters by Phuentsholing Thromde. Two out of three affected persons are not permanently employed. Their details are provided in subsequent page.

## **D. Socioeconomic Information and Profile**

9. Since socio-economic study was carried out during PPTA phase of 2816, it was not felt necessary to redo the same study in order to judiciously utilize the time and resources. For the socio-economic information, the PPTA socio-economic findings may be referred.

10. The project will affect three families who are presently working under Phuentsholing Thromde. However, no communities will be affected due to this Project. In fact, communities residing in Phuentsholing Thromde will be immensely be benefitted by the Project in view of prevailing heavy traffic congestions. Since all the affected persons are earning more than Nu.6,500 per months, they are not considered below poverty line which is Nu. 1,704.84 per person per month.

11. No impacts on private land are anticipated as the land required under this Project is Thromde (RGoB) owned land.

12. No impacts on the poor, indigenous and/or ethnic minorities and other vulnerable groups were observed.

13. The roster of FHHs to prepare the GAP was carried out and their willingness to work in the project sites was also documented. Very few members (3) from the FHHs were interested to work at the Project sites.

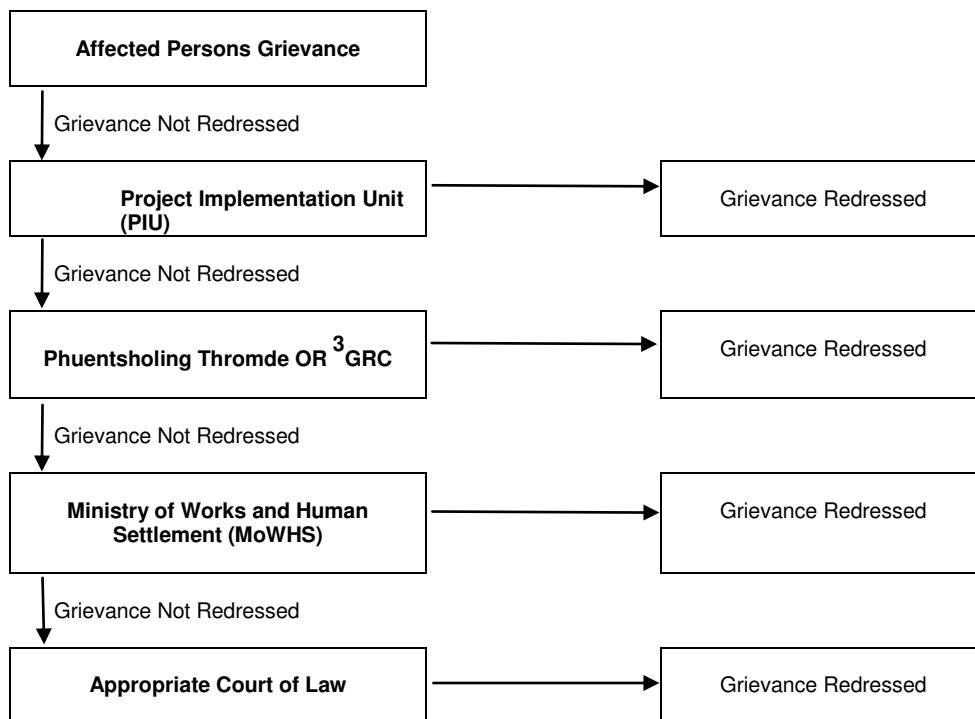
## **E. Information Disclosure, Consultation, and Participation**

14. The resettlement planning was prepared in consultation with stakeholders such as PIU and Thromde. Discussions and meetings (Consultation and Participation) were held involving stakeholders, particularly the affected households; and socioeconomic information were gathered to determine the potential resettlement impacts. Information has been disseminated to affected persons through one-on one discussion and will be further continued. Local language versions of the Resettlement Plan shall be prepared to be understandable to all the stakeholders. The Public Consultation was conducted in 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2016. There were a total of 55 participants of which consists of 22 female and 33 male. The meeting venue was fixed at the Conference hall of Phuentsholing Thromde. The photograph and the list of the participants during public consultation are attached in **Annex 3 and 4**. It was informed about the Project and the affected persons who were displaced were accommodated within the Thromde complex is provided with free basic amenities. Once the resettlement planning document is approved, the document will also be disclosed in the executing agency's (EA's) and in ADB's website, and information dissemination and consultation will continue throughout the project implementation phase. ADB review and approval of the resettlement plan is required prior to award of civil works contracts; No compensation/assistance of affected persons is required prior to commencement of civil works as all the project packages to be undertaken falls in government land. The affected persons were not given compensation as they work on temporary basis and provided housing of equal standard. The personal assets of affected persons were facilitated by the Phuentsholing Thromde by providing transportation to their new location.

## **F. Grievance Redressal Mechanism**

15. Grievances (if any) of affected persons will first be brought to the attention of the Project Implementation Unit (PIU). Grievances if not redressed by the PIU will be brought to the grievance redress committee (GRC) which shall consist of local government representative, the head of the PIU and a representative of the affected person. The committee will meet when a grievance is not resolved by the PIU. They will be given notice of the meeting, and the need for it to determine the merit of the grievance, and to resolve the grievance within a month of receiving the notice for the meeting. Further grievances will be referred by affected persons to the MoWHS and if not redressed then to appropriate courts of law. The flow chart of how the grievance redressal mechanism (GRM) is as follows;

16. The entire project works are undertaken in government land and the demolition of residential quarters which were also established in government land resulting displacement of three families working with Phuentsholing Thromde. They have now been accommodated near Thromde complex. It is however clear that there will be no grievances since the present housing is far better than the previous ones according to all the affected persons. The previous housing was a kind of makeshift hut type temporarily built and about 1.0 km away from their working place. The difference is that the present housing provided is a concreted house and a walking distance to their place of work.

## **G. Legal Framework**

17. The policy framework and entitlements for the Project are based on national law (i) *The Land Act, 1979* (LA amended in 2007), (ii) the *Land Compensation Rate, 2008/2009 (amended in 2017)* and (iii) ADB's *Policy on Safeguard Policy Statement 2009*. Based on these, the following core involuntary resettlement principles applicable are:

- (i) Involuntary resettlement will be avoided as far as possible. If it is unavoidable, it shall be minimized;
- (ii) Where involuntary resettlement is unavoidable, affected persons will be assisted to re-establish themselves;
- (iii) Lack of formal legal land title is not a bar for compensation and resettlement assistance;
- (iv) Each affected person whose income or livelihood is affected shall be entitled to receive assistance to restore income and livelihood at pre-project standards, and all vulnerable APs are entitled to receive additional assistance;
- (v) All affected persons will be fully informed and consulted on compensation, entitlements, and resettlement assistance;
- (vi) Affected persons will be fully involved in the selection of development options at the earliest opportunity;
- (vii) Affected persons social and cultural institutions will be protected and supported;
- (viii) Compensation and resettlement assistance will be fully provided before approving any subcomponent, if it involves involuntary resettlement impacts; and

## **H. Entitlements, Assistance and Benefits**

18. The entitlement assistance and benefits is described in **Table 2** below. However, the three affected persons are Thromde appointed staff, of which two affected persons are under muster roll while one affected person is a permanent staff. As entitlement for the affected persons and as a good practice, the salvaged materials were given to the affected persons and their household belongings were transported to their new location free of cost by the Thromde. As far as compensation is concerned, no allowance is required as the affected persons are provided with better accommodation as compared to previous housing. The affected persons have indicated that they are fully satisfied with their present location and "No Objection" from the affected persons. **Annex 5.**

## **I. Relocation of Housing and Settlements**

19. All the three affected persons have been provided with better accommodations adjacent to the Thromde office which has resulted in easy accessibility to their job. The household belongings were transported free of cost to their new location. No compensation for livelihood assistance has been provided because all three affected persons are staff working for the Phuentsholing Thromde. (One permanent staff and two temporary staffs). It is assured by the Thromde that the three affected persons will not be relocated further even after the Project is implemented.

## **J. Income Restoration and rehabilitation**

20. During the time of PPTA, no compensation and income restoration was anticipated as all the three affected persons were working with Thromde as a Night guard, Driver and Customer complaint receiver. Hence, it is not required to provide assistance regarding compensation through transitional and other short-term allowances and assistance in finding structures to rent/lease and alternative jobs. None of the affected persons are vulnerable or below poverty line as they are receiving more than Nu. 6,500 per month. The total poverty line is Nu. 1,704.84 per person per month according to Bhutan Poverty Analysis 2012.

## **K. Resettlement Budget and Financing Plan**

21. The Department of Engineering Services (DES) under the Ministry of Works and Human Settlement (MoWHS) is the executing agency responsible for implementing the Project. A Project Management Unit (PMU) has been established under DES, to support the Project while a Project Implementation Unit (PIU) has been established in the Phuentsholing Thromde (PT). The PIU will manage the day-to-day operations and resettlement plan implementation, excluding monitoring which will be undertaken throughout the project period. The responsible agencies for resettlement activities especially for the case of three families working with Phuentsholing Thromde is being taken care by the PIU, Phuentsholing. The resettlement cost is not applicable as all the affected persons were provided with better housing and free transportation (to shift their belongings to the new housing) was borne entirely by the Phuentsholing Thromde. The resettlement cost is not required as is apparent in **Table 3** below.

## M. Implementation Schedule

23. The resettlement process with regards to the displaced affected persons was completed before the start of civil works. The affected persons have been given sufficient notice (4 months) prior to start of civil works. The implementation schedule is provided in **Table 5** below.

24. The civil works will be linked with the completion of land acquisition and compensation prior to the commencement of civil work. The land required under this Project is Thromde

(RGoB) owned and does not require any land compensation. The PIU served the notification to the displaced affected persons through Phuentsholing Thromde administration four months prior to taking over of the land and structures. This facilitated the affected persons to prepare dismantling and salvaging materials and their household items so that the Project impact will be further minimized and mitigated.

## N. Monitoring and Reporting

25. The monitoring aspect will cover physical and financial components and facilitate provision of feedback to maintain the implementation of resettlement plan on schedule. This resettlement plan implementation will be closely monitored to provide the PMU with an effective basis for assessing progress and identifying potential difficulties and problems. The PIU/Phuentsholing Thromde will be mandated to carry out internal monitoring. Monthly progress report prepared by the PIU/PT will be submitted to PMU, by reporting actual achievements against the targets that have been fixed for their respective activities and reasons for shortfalls, if any.

26. There are three affected persons who have already been accommodated within the Thromde complex. Besides, the implementing agency will undertake external monitoring which will also include monitoring of the Project on a half yearly basis and submit reports directly to PMU. The PMU will submit all reports to ADB for review.

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






### No Objection

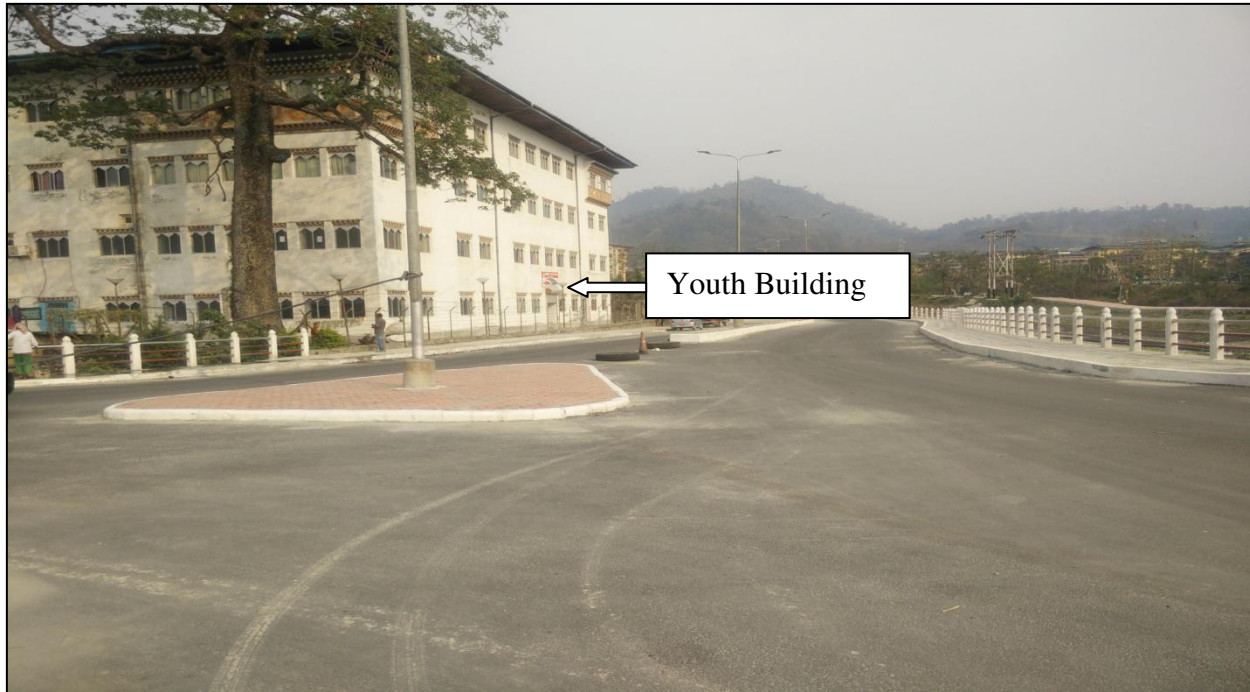
