### I. POVERTY IMPACT AND SOCIAL DIMENSIONS

#### A. Links to the National Poverty Reduction Strategy and Country Partnership Strategy

The program will support Yichang Municipal Government's (YMG) efforts to develop systems to deliver quality and affordable home-based, community-based, and institutional elderly care (EC). The program will contribute to improving the quality of life for older persons, and directly address the demographic and economic challenges posed by the increasing care needs of Yichang rapidly aging population.

The program will support the People's Republic of China's (PRC) Thirteenth Five-Year Plan, 2016–2020, and the Yichang 13th Five-Year Plan (2016–2020); which will prioritize developing EC and expanding the three-tiered system (institutional, community-based, and home-based) of services. It is directly responsive to the State Council Opinions on Promoting the Development of Senior Care Service Industry issued in 2013, which seeks to stimulate investment in the sector and define roles and responsibilities for government and the private sector in the provision of EC services. The reform agenda of the Third Plenary Session of the 18th Central Committee of the Chinese Communist Party in November 2013 calls for an acceleration of reforms to improve and expand the provision of social services, such as education, health, EC, and social protection. The program is aligned with the Asian Development Bank's (ADB) country partnership strategy's (2016–2020) pillar on inclusive growth, the focus in the midterm review of Strategy 2020 on supporting social protection and health, and concurs with ADB's Health Operational Plan for 2020, which has development of elderly care systems (ECSs) and services as a focus area.

#### C. Poverty and Social Analysis

1. Key issues and potential beneficiaries. The PRC's population is aging rapidly at a time when the per capita income remains modest. Social security systems cover a broad portion of the population, but are still insufficient to meet the financial needs of retired senior citizens. Yichang Municipality had a total population of over 4.15 million, and an urban population of 1.53 million; there were 652,100 senior citizens over 60 years of age, representing about 16.06% of the overall population, and above the national average of 13.70%. In 2015, the number of people aged 65 and above in the urban districts was an estimated 103,000 (6.7%). Among these urban elderly, there is great diversity in care needs and their circumstances (income sources and level, assets, and family support). The significant increase of the elderly population will produce wide impacts on economy and society, and is creating a huge pressure to rapidly develop an ECS that can serve both rural and urban populations especially at lower income levels.

2. Impact channels and expected systemic changes. Impact channels include development of the ECS quality and service standards for YMG and improvements to the coverage, affordability, and quality of ECS.

3. Focus of (and resources allocated in) the TA or due diligence. Issues to be reviewed during the project design include the (i) affordability of ECS and care inclusiveness, (ii) capacity of government and private sector service providers to deliver quality three-tiered care; and (iii) needs and concerns of elderly Tujias (ethnic minority group).

4. Specific analysis for policy-based lending. Not applicable.

### II. GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT

1. What are the key gender issues in the sector/subsector that are likely to be relevant to this project or program? The gender dimensions of aging are in many ways the results of a lifetime of accumulation of vulnerabilities. Issues include disparities in lifespans for men and women, and in men's and women's financial assets to pay for care services, existing multigenerational care provider roles of women, and differential health care needs of men and women. One special area of concern is also regarding dementia and accompanying care needs since more women than men internationally are affected. A potential benefit is in the human resources development for the sector and the large employment impacts it can make for women.

Among them, <i>Tujia</i> ethnic minority counts for the most. Overall, the project impacts are anticipated to be positive.
