ABOUT SWEDEN

According to 2013 figures from the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, Sweden's official development assistance (ODA) reached \$5.56 billion in 2013 or 1.02% of its gross national income (GNI) which is a 6% increase from 2012. One percent (1%) of GNI is to be maintained for 2014–2016.

Fifty percent of Sweden's ODA is handled by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and 50% is administered by the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida), an agency under the government.

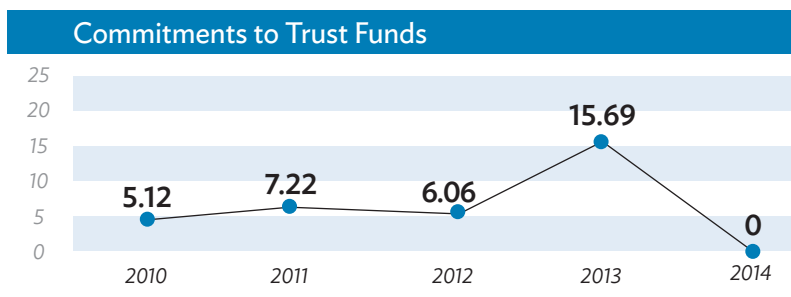
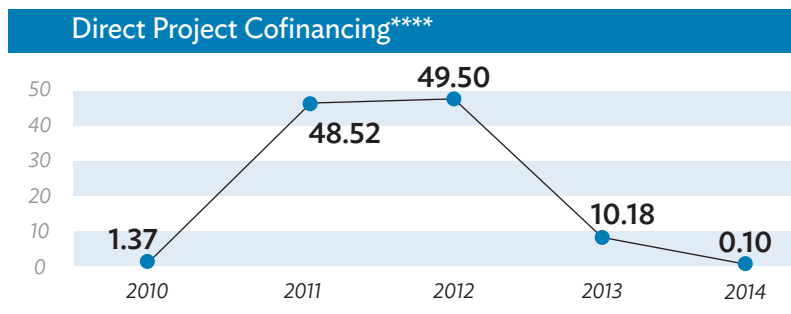

5. End-Use Facilities new or retrofits/upgrades
6. Manufacturing renewable energy components, e.g. solar panels, and high-equipment

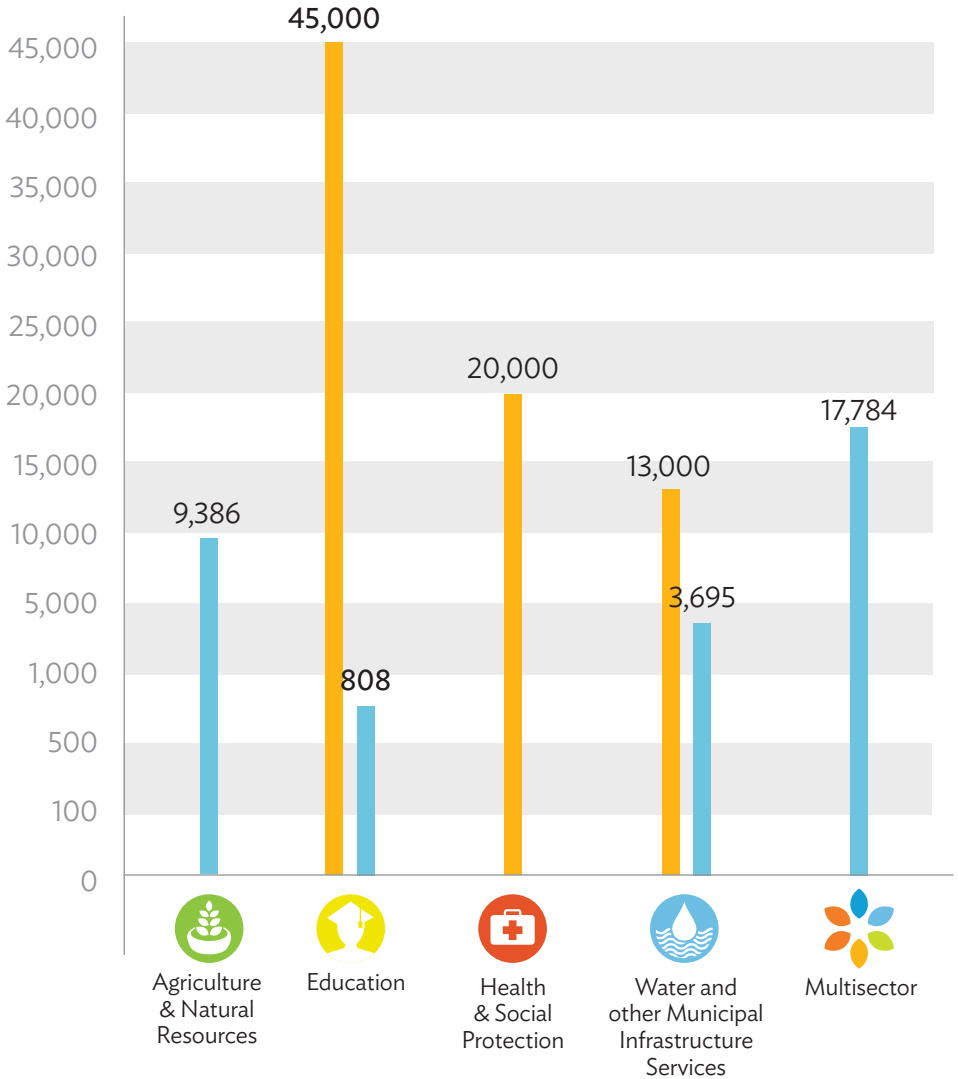

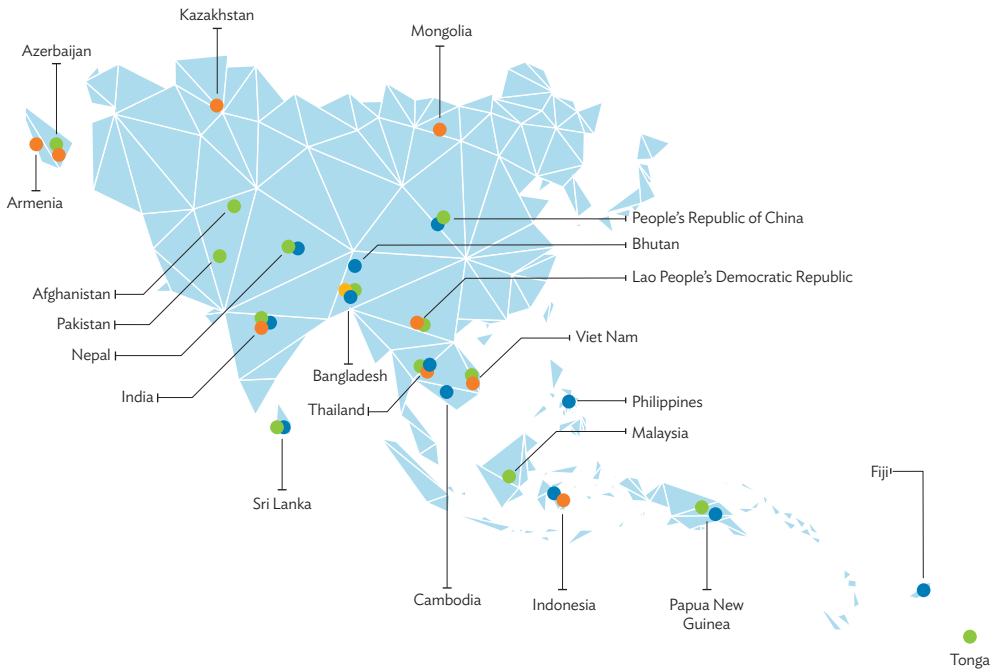
COFINANCING BY SECTOR, 2010–2014 (\$'000)

Sweden assists countries in Asia, Africa, Europe and Latin America through development cooperation. Sida works according to the directives of the Swedish Government to reduce poverty and for equitable and sustainable development.

Sweden's regional development cooperation in Asia and the development cooperation with Myanmar are handled from the Embassy of Sweden in Bangkok. The bilateral development cooperation with Bangladesh and Cambodia are handled by the Swedish embassies in those countries. The bilateral development cooperation with Afghanistan is handled from Sida in Stockholm.
